2:30 pm to 5:30 pm	Faulkner Room	 PRE-SUMMIT SESSION A: Telehealth in Criminal Justice and Correctional Settings Over the past thirty years, populations in both adult and juvenile correctional facilities have increased dramatically, creating significant challenges with overcrowding and putting a strain on the capacity for these facilities to meet the health and mental/behavioral health care needs of those in these facilities. In a closing plenary session at the 2014 National Commission on Correctional Health Care Leadership Institutes, the Medical Director of the Federal Bureau of Prisons presented an overview of emerging management and clinical opportunities that could lead to better, more cost-effective patient care in correctional medicine. In his talk, a strong case for creative uses of telehealth was made. Although correctional telehealth was first introduced into the prison systems almost twenty years ago, there is still a significant opportunity for increasing its adoption across a variety of clinical use cases, within a greater range of correctional settings, and using an array of telehealth technologies. Telehealth is also being used with increasing frequency in forensic settings, for purposes such as mental health and competency evaluations to delivering care to victims of sexual and elder abuse. 1:00 pm to 6:00 pm	Lansdowne Ballroom	 Session B: Telehealth and the Opioid Epidemic: Protecting Safety and Promoting Health Prescription opioids are commonly used to reduce pain for a variety of health conditions, but if not used correctly, can lead to overdose deaths and longer term addictions. Heroin is another form of an opioid that is illegally obtained. It too can also lead to overdose deaths and longer term addictions. More people died from drug overdoses in 2014 than in any other year on record, and the majority of those deaths involved an opioid. In March 2015, the US Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Secretary Sylvia M. Burwell announced an initiative targeting three priority areas to tackle the opioid epidemic and help save lives. These include: improving prescribing practices, expanding access to and the use of medication-assisted treatment, and expanding the use of naloxone. Much progress has been made in these key areas, but much more still needs to be accomplished along the whole continuum of care if we are truly to make progress in reversing the course. Efforts in relationship to prevention and screening, patient and provider education, and the combination of evidence-based models of medication and psychosocial interventions are all needed. Telehealth technologies are tools that can be used across the whole continuum of care. Session C: Telegenetics Understanding the role of clinical genetics for both health and disease plays a significant role in the prevention, diagnosis and treatment of many common conditions across the lifespan. 


Exhibit Hall Floor Map


